### Strengths

- Sport and expertise originated here in the U.S.
- More experience at high level features
- Movement toward banked SL assisting with teaching carving skills

#### Weaknesses

- Lack needed venues at top levels in SBX/SX and HP in particular
- Total SB population through NSAA is trending down
- Gender gap wide between men and women
- SBX/SX needs to lower standards (allow younger athletes) to have sufficient field size
- More athletes interested than competitions available below Rev Tour level
- Lack of female coaches
- Rev Tour events are held on weekdays so parks can be open to public on weekends – impact on academics
- Travel costs are a large burden
- Rev Tour "race to register"

### **Opportunities**

- Centralized training opportunities on world-class venues that can be built
- Mid-level series underneath Rev Tour SS
- Banked SL continued development move 12 & unders to this event from SBX/SX
- Qualification process to Rev Tour prepare athletes and get right athletes there as opposed to the registration rush
- Better use of carrots within existing series to motivate participation and progression
- Outreach to new demographics

# Threats

- Other countries making up expertise and experience advantage we once had
- Cost to build venues with limited population that can ski/ride them
- Foreign national teams reserving limited venues in U.S., particularly early season
- Injury rate
- Competition from big mountain
- Insurance
